Update: Littleton Village

The empty field bordered by Dry Creek Road, Broadway, and Geddes Ave, formerly home to Marathon Oil's petroleum and technology research facility, continues down the road towards becoming a center for dining, shopping, and living. The property is separated into two tracts of land, with the first tract (closest to Broadway) currently approved for mixed use. Plans have been submitted to the City of Littleton to amend the previously submitted traffic and street orientations of Tract I. While Tract II plans are expected, none of them have been made available online as of this printing.

The members of the Southglenn Garden Club offer these tips to help make the most of your landscape.

1. **Pamper your trees and shrubs.** Trees and shrubs are the most valuable plants in your landscape and they need some tender loving care in this drought year. If you have trees and shrubs not growing in a lawn, they need weekly watering. Other trees and shrubs should get enough moisture from the lawn watering. Check soil moisture before watering. Insert a screwdriver into the soil. If it can be easily inserted to a depth of 6 inches, you don't need to water. Add mulch to a depth of 3 – 4 inches to conserve moisture.
2. **Keep after those weeds!** Hand pulling and hoeing are most effective against weed seedlings and should be done every other week. Mowing reduces weed seed production but has limited value in controlling weeds. You can also smother weeds to prevent light from reaching weed plants. Hay, grass clippings, wood chips, newspaper & black covers work well. Chemical control, when used properly, can safely and effectively control weeds. Allow spray to dry before allowing people or pets into the treated area.
3. **Divide and replant iris.** Hopefully your iris put on a show these last few weeks. If not, they are probably too crowded and need to be divided. Irises are well adapted for Colorado gardens and their leaves add great structure. Dig up a clump with a spade. Break off and separate the fans. Discard any **rhizome (roots)** with holes in them or that are diseased. Re-plant the rhizomes 4 – 6 inches apart and water well.
4. **Improve growing conditions.** Fertilize summer blooming plants, annuals and roses. The vegetable garden will benefit from an application of 5-10-5 fertilizer or adding a layer of compost & manure, plus bone meal. Keep watering your raspberries; they need lots of water to produce berries. Raspberries also benefit from monthly fertilization. Consistently water tomatoes to prevent fruit from cracking or developing blossom end rot. Strawberry beds should be renewed every three years by digging up all the plants, saving and re-planting the young ones. So let the runners grow this time of year. Plant a new bed in late August by carefully removing good, healthy, rooted runners and using them for planting the new bed.
5. **Keep planting!** In mid-July plant beets, beans, kale, broccoli, carrots, cauliflower and chard for a fall harvest. August is the best time to plant arugula, cabbage, endive, spinach, and cilantro. In September you can plant peas, radishes, Chinese greens, more spinach and lettuce.
6. **Tidy up the garden.** Remove spent blooms (deadhead) on daylilies, zinnias, and petunias. Remove spent roses by cutting the stem just above the uppermost 5-leaflet.

 - Petco at S University and E Dry Creek Rd and Petsmart at S University and County Line Rd are always fun for my preschoolers and toddler. They love looking at all the different rodents, reptiles, tarantulas, fish, dogs, and cats, and birds on display. It's like a mini-zoo for younger children.
 - Parks nearby (within 5 miles) include: Clarkson, Puma, Milliken, DeKoevend, Cherry Knolls, Gallup, Cornerstone, Belleview. Every park offers different amenities and opportunities for fun depending on kids ages and interests. Even better, there are shallow creeks to play in at DeKoevend, Cherry Knolls, and Belleview. Belleview Park also has a train and petting zoo during the summer.
 - McDonald's Playland for rainy days or scorches. Our favorite is the one at County Line Rd and S Holly because it appeals to a wide age range of kids with several entrances into the climbing maze.
 - Chic-Fil-A play places are fun too. Though smaller, my preschoolers still enjoy these climbing areas on days we can't be outside.
 - Carson Nature Center is like a mini-Natural History Museum located to the west of Aspen Grove. Take a nature walk and play in the creek.
- If you're willing to drop some green, there's always:

 - Colorado Journey mini-golf at Belleview and S Windermere
 - Indoor and outdoor pools. Our favorites are Lone Tree Rec Center and Buck Rec Center indoor pools and Franklin outdoor pool but there are lots to choose from
 - Monster indoor mini-golf (S Holly and County Line Rd); might be a little scary for kids under 4 yrs
 - Little Monkey Business and Monkey Business indoor play areas
 - Lakeside and Elitches Amusement Parks
 - Denver Children's Museum
 - Denver Zoo

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

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Auto Maintenance Corner

As temperatures climb and traffic snarls, the last thing we often think about is the health of our vehicles. An oasis of air conditioning amidst a parking lot of gridlock, our vehicles provide us safety and comfort but can be just as susceptible to the heat as we are. Remember to routinely check and change the fluids in your vehicles. Higher temperatures strain engines, especially when they're forced to climb mountain passes and roads, making lubrication essential to auto health. At high temperatures oil begins to breakdown and starts losing its lubricating capabilities, causing engines to bog and even lock up. Just as important as keeping your oil topped off and fresh is making sure that your engine's coolant is up to snuff. If it's been a while since the last time the coolant in your vehicle was replaced, try taking it to a garage to get the coolant flushed, or do it yourself. If taking this on yourself, be sure to consult your maintenance manuals and be sure to free as much air as possible from the system. Believe it or not the same coolant that keeps your engine from overheating can keep your air conditioning blowing cool. Does your car spend a majority of the day outside? If so, regular washes will help to keep windows clear and the outside world visible. Regular washes also provide the added benefit of being able to spot any scratches, dings, or damage to your car's exterior. If it's been a while since your last wash, consider selecting a car wash with undercarriage cleaning. Caustic road chemicals used for deicing can wreak havoc on exposed metal. Remember to regularly check tire pressures and inspect the treads for excessive wear. Use the penny test to gauge tire life. If Lincoln's head is still visible on a penny inserted into the tread upside down, it's time for new tires. With the heating and cooling of the day, air in tires can expand and contract, leaving an overinflated tire prone to excess stress in the heat and an underinflated tire to irregular wear during the morning commute.
